Friendship in bloom

Centennial garden dedication commemorates relationship between township, German city

NORRITON EAST Centennial Friendship Garden dedicated late Tuesday afternoon in front of the township building was called "a lasting symbol," a "garden of friendship" and a "seed of hope" by township officials and an official visitor from Germany.

14-year-old daughter, Sophia, read the German translation.

"The friendship between our towns provides a positive example," Zehrer said. "The garden of friendship is a tangible thing."

"People in Treptow-Kopenick are really fond of East Norriton. They are interested in American life," she said before the ceremony. "We are really dedicated to our partnership with this American community."

A crowd of 65 endured briskly cold winds during the 20-minute, outdoor dedication ceremony.

The Rev. Byron Craig of Macedonia Baptist Church in East Norriton started the invocation with, "Let us look to the Lord. Hopefully it will get warmer as we pray."

Supervisors' Chairman Lewis McQuirns recalled that East Norriton was formed Oct. 12, 1908 when Norriton Township was split into East Norriton and West Norriton

by a court order.

He called the garden "a lasting symbol of our centennial celebration. We hope this garden serves as a reminder of our friendship."

Norristown Area School District Supt. Janet Samuels likened the garden, framed by sandstone boulders weighing 150 pounds to one ton, as "the seeds of opportunity and the seeds of hope."

Francis "Bud" Denner, chairman of the Centennial Committee, called the location for the garden "most appropriate" because the township's Veterans Memorial and a township cemetery are nearby.

"This is East Norriton's hallowed ground," he said.

State Rep. Jay Moyer, R-70th Dist., brought a ceremonial \$10,000 check for the garden's construction costs.

"This is a wonderful symbol for the township," Moyer said.

State Sen. Connie Williams, D-17th Dist., has been seeking an additional \$10,000 state contribution for the garden, said Township Manager Helmuth Baerwald. Williams did not attend the ceremony.

The East Norriton Middle School choir and band sang and played the American Pledge of Allegiance and the German national anthem.

Residents toured the garden of annual and perennial flower beds, shrubs and small pine trees, a central bubbler fountain, natural stone pavers and a row of sandstone boulders after the ceremony.
