



Homelessness in Finland 2020



Includes people living temporarily with friends and relatives, sofa surfers, 64%



Shelter renovation: Why we wanted to get rid of shelters and hostels – and what made it possible?

- Living in a hostel or shelter is always a temporary solution
- A person living in a hostel is still homeless
- No privacy and very limited professional help in your problems
- Hostels sustain a culture of irresponsibility, a "prison-like" subculture
- Renovation of hostels has increased public safety
- Carrot: State grants for renovation 50%
- Stick: Obligation to work according to Housing First principles in the future
- Systematic training for personnel (also new personnel hired)

What has not worked so well: Challenges and Failures

New National programme 2020-2023

- 1. Aim to halve the existing homelessness (and end it by 2027) with Housing First
- 2. 11 biggest "homelessness" cities, city specific plans
- 3. Social housing share to be increased from 25% to 30% in new housing areas
- 4. Housing advisory services will be statutory
- Developing new low treshold services and forms of support in scattered housing





Critical elements of ending homelessness

Housing First as the mainstream policy

Permanent housing solutions

Alternative housing solutions and tailor-made support

Affordable social housing (structural prevention)


Method of **implementation**:

- Wide partnership
- Concrete measurable quantitative goals
- Short timespan from decision to execution
